Second Position- Ananya Thakur Biotech (Ist year)

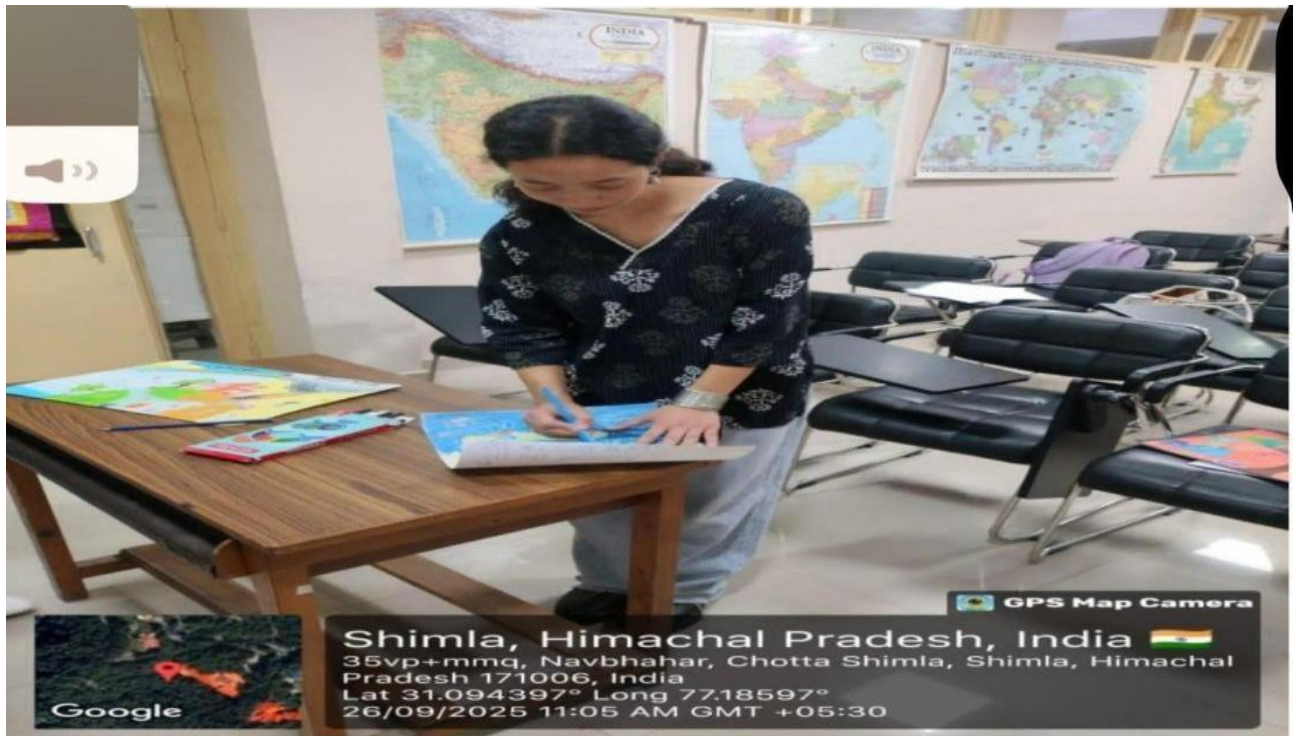
**Outcome:**

**Event:** Disaster Awareness Drill

**Objective:** To equip participants with essential search and rescue skills, ensuring they are prepared to respond effectively in disaster situations, to provide training in basic healthcare and first aid, enabling participants to address medical emergencies during disasters and to boost participants' confidence in their ability to handle emergencies, contributing to a culture of preparedness in the community.

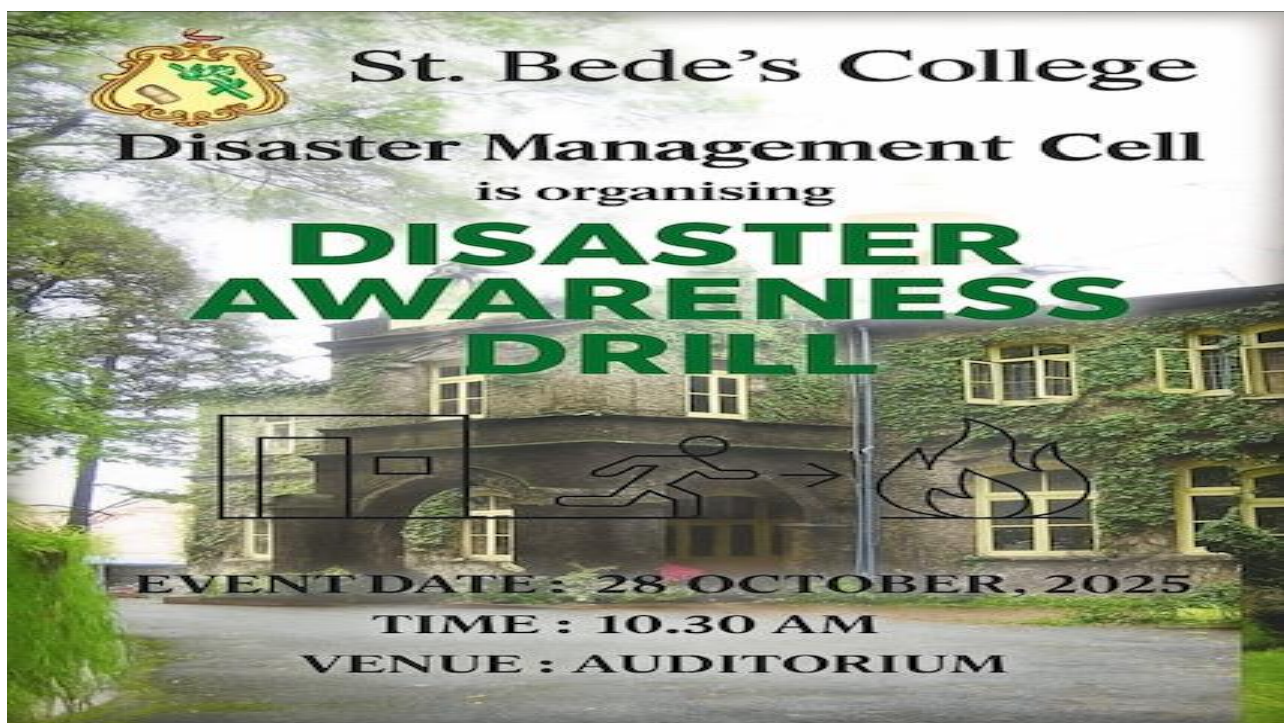
On October 28, the Disaster Management Cell organised a comprehensive Training Exercise focusing on Basic Healthcare and Disaster Awareness, which was conducted by the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF). The event aimed to enhance the preparedness and response capabilities of participants in the face of various disasters. The event commenced with an opening address by the President of the cell, Ms Tamanna Natuyal, emphasising the importance of preparedness in disaster management, followed by the introduction and felicitation of **SP Shri Arjit Sen Thakur and DSP Smt. Gulshan Negi SDRF**. After this, SP Shri Arjit Sen Thakur and his dedicated team conducted sessions on various topics, including:



- Search and Rescue Techniques: Participants learned about essential strategies for locating and assisting victims during disasters.
- Basic Healthcare: Training on first aid, CPR, and trauma care was provided, empowering participants to manage medical emergencies effectively.
- Disaster Awareness: Discussions focused on identifying risks, understanding disaster response plans, and community preparedness.

The event received enthusiastic participation from students, who appreciated the practical learning approach and the efforts of the SDRF team for ensuring the smooth execution of the exercise and providing valuable insights to participants. The training program was concluded by the SP SDRF Shri Arjit Sen Thakur and DSP Smt. Gulshan Negi, which was followed by the Disaster Awareness Exhibition conducted by the SDRF team, features a display of search and rescue equipment, emergency kits, stretchers, helmets, fire safety tools, and communication devices. Students were provided hands-on experience at interactive stations where they practised CPR, knot-tying, first aid, and the programme handling. The Disaster Management Cell extends its gratitude to all the students, trainers, and support staff for their contributions to the event's success.

**Outcome:** This event has laid the groundwork for ongoing training and awareness initiatives, reinforcing the importance of collective effort in disaster management. The students as well as the faculty members gained valuable skills and knowledge that will enable them to respond effectively during emergencies.

**Date:** December 16, 2025

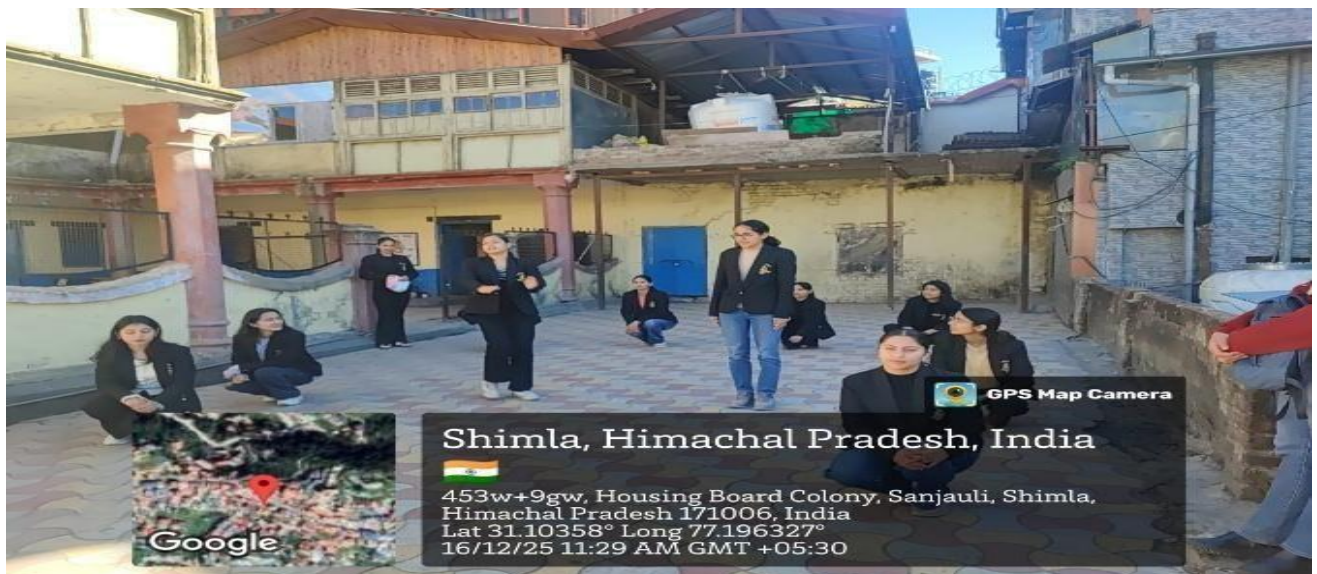
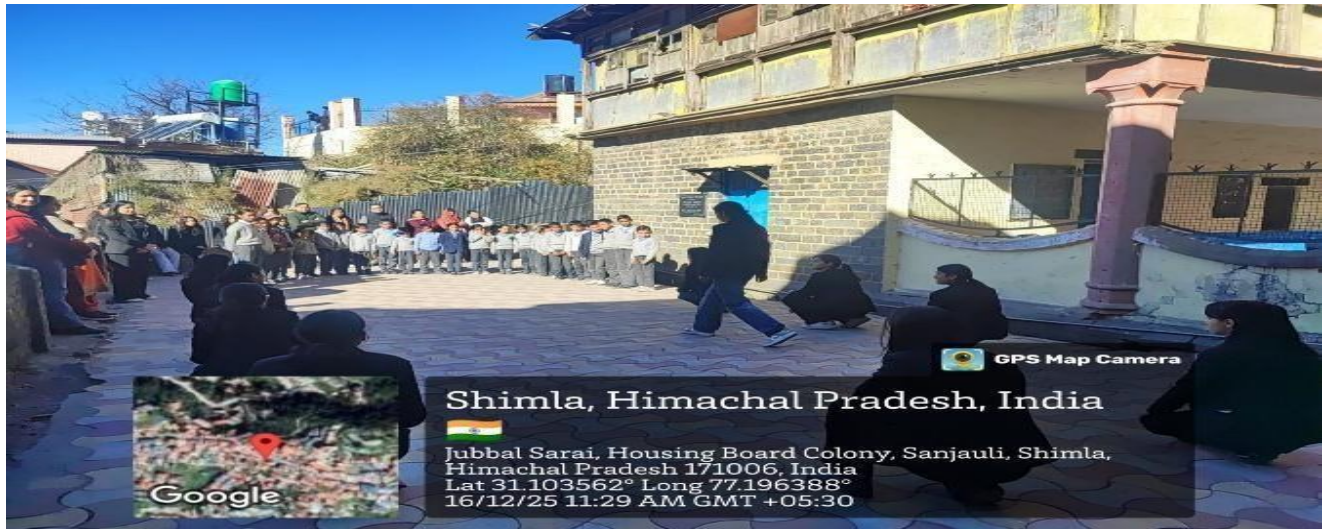

The Disaster Management Cell of St. Bede's College, in collaboration with the Environment Cell, organised a Nukkad Natak on the theme "Environment Sustainability" on 16th December, 2025, at Govt. Primary School, Sanjauli. The programme began with a brief introduction about environmental issues such as waste generation, pollution, deforestation, and water scarcity. The team highlighted how simple everyday actions—like reducing the use of plastics, proper waste disposal and planting more trees—can help protect the environment.
